NOTES:

1. Accounting, Administration, Economics, Commerce

For pre-2008 students, the maximum annual student contribution amount that may be charged for Accounting, Administration, Economics and Commerce units is **\$8,050**. This amount applies to Commonwealth supported students who commenced a course of study before 1 January 2008 and are covered by the savings provision in Schedule 7 of the Higher Education Legislation Amendment (2007 Budget Measures) Act 2007.

2. Education and Nursing

- a. For pre-2010 students, the maximum annual student contribution amount that may be charged for Education and Nursing units is **\$4,520**.
- b. From 1 January 2010, the maximum annual student contribution amount for commencing Commonwealth supported students undertaking education and nursing units of study has been increased from the 'national priority' rate to the band 1 rate.
- c. The increased maximum annual student contribution amounts affect only students who commence their course of study at a higher education provider on or after 1 January 2010.

3. Mathematics, Statistics and Science

- a. For pre-2009 students, the maximum annual student contribution amount that may be charged for Mathematics, Statistics and Science units is **\$8,050**.
- b. The national priority maximum annual student contribution amount applies to students studying mathematics, statistics and science who commenced their course of study on or after 1 January 2009, regardless of the course of study. The national priority maximum also applies to continuing students who transfer to a course of study in the Natural and Physical Sciences from one that is not.
- c. Mathematics, statistics and science units of study are those units of study in the natural and physical sciences Field of Education that are classified in Chapter 9 of the Commonwealth Grant Scheme (CGS) Guidelines as being in the Funding Clusters applying to 'Mathematics and Statistics' and/or 'Science' (currently clusters 3 or 7, although cluster numbering may alter in updated Guidelines following legislative amendment)..

d. A natural and physical sciences course of study means a course of study in the field of natural and physical sciences that is, Broad Field 01 in the *Australian Standard Classification of Education (ASCED) 2001* (Catalogue. no. 1272.0), Australian Bureau of Statistics, Commonwealth of Australia, (2001) Canberra.

To calculate student contributions for a subject:

Please refer to the table: Higher education subjects for 2011 on the Tabor Adelaide website. From this table, the Student Contribution Band and the EFTSL value can be obtained. The above table is then used for the correct band, to calculate the relevant student contribution. Full fee-paying higher education students, including FEE-HELP students, should see the separate Higher Education Tuition Fee Tables as Table SC above does not apply to them.

If you are not sure how to calculate how much you should be paying, the Information for Commonwealth Supported Students booklet contains detailed instructions and examples of how to calculate your student contribution. This booklet is obtainable from the Australian Taxation Office, Centrelink, Tabor Adelaide's Student Services or can be downloaded from the Commonwealth Government's Going to Uni website.

Brief Information on Help Loans

1. Eligible students in any of Tabor College Adelaide's higher education courses (*associate degrees, bachelor degrees, graduate certificates, graduate diplomas, master degrees and Doctorates*) can obtain a FEE-HELP loan to cover the cost of their tuition fees.
2. Commonwealth supported places, allocated on the basis of merit and eligibility, are available for a limited number of Education students in specified teacher education courses.

FEE-HELP

- FEE-HELP is a Commonwealth Government loan program designed to assist eligible students in higher education courses to pay their tuition fees.
- To be eligible for FEE-HELP you must be an Australian citizen, or the holder of a permanent humanitarian visa who will be resident in Australia for the duration of the subject.
- A loan fee of 25% will apply to FEE-HELP loans for undergraduate courses, but not for postgraduate courses. The loan fee is not included in the limit.
- FEE-HELP will be available for full-time or part-time study.
- Students who wish to do so will be able to pay all or part of their tuition fees up-front and to take a FEE-HELP loan to cover any balance. (The 25% loan fee will apply only to the amount that is borrowed.)

HECS-HELP

- HECS-HELP is a Commonwealth Government loan scheme that applies only to eligible students in Commonwealth supported places. Tabor Adelaide has been allocated a number of Commonwealth supported places in Teacher Education.
- Students in these places are Commonwealth supported and do not pay tuition fees but pay a student contribution instead.
- Through HECS-HELP, Commonwealth supported students are able to defer payment of their student contribution with a Government loan.
- HECS-HELP loans do not attract any fees.
- To be eligible for HECS-HELP at Tabor you must be an Australian citizen, or the holder of a permanent humanitarian visa and be allocated one of the College's National Priority Places in teaching.

Repayment of HELP loans

- HELP loans are repaid through the tax system on a sliding scale, starting once a person's income is above the minimum threshold for compulsory repayment.

Census Dates

A census date is the date during the subject by which your enrolment requirements for that subject must be finalised. Census dates are set by Tabor for each subject of study offered. These are key dates and are very important for students. They cannot be changed or extended. Withdrawals before or after the relevant census date have different consequences.

The census date is important because it is the deadline for all of the following:

- Finalising your enrolment with Tabor Adelaide;
- Completing and submitting your HECS-HELP or FEE-HELP form;
- Paying part or all of your fees up-front, if you wish to pay up-front;
- Providing your Tax File Number, if you have requested a HECS-HELP or FEE-HELP loan.

If you remain enrolled in a subject as a HECS student at the close of business on the census date you will:

- Consume Student Learning Entitlement (SLE) for that subject;
- Be liable to pay your Student contribution for that subject; and
- Incur a HECS-HELP debt if you have requested a loan for your Student contribution amount for that subject.

If you remain enrolled in a subject as a fee paying student at the close of business on the census date you will:

- Incur a FEE-HELP debt if you have requested a loan for your Tuition fee for that subject; and
- Be liable for the balance of any part of your Tuition fee which has not been paid up-front.

You must enter into a fee payment arrangement prior to the census date or your enrolment will be cancelled. The 2012 Census dates are:

Census 1	March 23	Applies to semester 1 subjects, and intensives delivered prior to Feb 27
Census 2	May 18	Applies to full year subjects, and intensives delivered prior to April 23
Census 3	August 24	Applies to semester 2 subjects, and intensives delivered prior to Aug 1
Census 4	November 2	Applies to intensives delivered prior to Oct 8
Census 5	December 14	Applies to Summer School, and intensives delivered prior to Nov 19

The delivery periods, census dates, weightings and classifications of higher education subjects are provided in Table HEU, which is available from Student Services on request and is also on the Tabor Adelaide website.
